- 2. Updated college's Mission Statement:

We prioritize accessibility, equity, and social justice through student-centered support services and educational opportunities for global learning. We offer general education, associate and bachelor's degrees, transfer pathways, certificates, and career technical education for personal enrichment and economic mobility.

- 1. City College is a Caring Campus for ALL. You Belong Here!
 - Selected by Brad C. Phillips from the Institute for Evidence-Based Change (IEBC) to serve as a model caring campus for the state.
 - Partnering with National Conflict Resolution Center to support classified professionals, managers, and supervisors.
 - Partnering with district HR and R and D
 Facilitation to support faculty leadership with addressing conflict.
 - Advancing professional development on campus with a new coordinator, location, dean.
 - Creating safe spaces for brave discussions.
 - Adding safe parking areas and industrial lockers.





- 2. Improving the Student Journey.
 - Building affordable student housing.
 - Supporting the reorganization of the Dean of IDEAAS.
 - Expanding learning communities on campus (AAPI, Somali, and LGBT+).
 - Reimagining the Transfer Center and Learning Resource Center (Library).
 - Increasing FAFSA submissions by 15%.
 - Becoming a Black-serving institution (SB 1348);
 City College is currently a Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) and an Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving institution (AANAPISI).
 - Supporting efforts to advance HSI and AANAPISI.
 - Creating cultural relevant spaces; renaming the Dreamer Resource Center to the Undocumented Resource Center and relocating to the L Building.



- 3. Enrollment Management.
 - Improve Retention, Retention, Retention.
 - Rebuild our career education programs (cosmetology, AIRE/HVAC, electronics).
 - Expand concurrent enrollment by 500 students in the summer.
 - Support working adults and part-time students.
 - Expand into maritime industry and careers at the Port of San Diego.
 - Expand academic programs off-site at businesses and community organizations.
 - Support the expansion of bachelor's programs, specifically nursing (AB 895).





- 4. Effective Budget Management.
 - Effective college operations after the end of COVID funding.
 - Financial stewards during declining state budget.
 - Manage categorical budgets impacted by having no COLA.
 - Maximize SCFF funding with a focus on the supplemental allocation.
 - Monitor inflation and rising costs.
 - Expand revenue within the Foundation and facilities rentals.
 - Launch City College's 110th anniversary campaign.
