The Puente Project is a flagship program combining writing instruction, counseling, and mentoring to help students transfer to four-year institutions, with a focus on Mexican American/Latino literature and community-based support.

SDCC also promotes Chicanx/Latinx culture and social justice through MEChA, a student-led organization, and offers additional support via Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS), which provides financial aid, tutoring, and academic advising for first-generation students.

Chicanx/Latinx Resources

Courses

Chicana and Chicano Studies Department

The Chicana and Chicano Studies Department offers an interdisciplinary program exploring the history, challenges, and achievements of Mexican, Mexican American, and Latinx populations. The curriculum emphasizes social justice through arts, literature, history, and social sciences.

CHIC 110A Intro to Chicana/o Studies

This course provides an overview of Chicana/o Studies, focusing on the historical development, Mesoamerican roots, cultural identity, political activities, and contemporary roles of Chicano people in U.S. society. Ideal for students interested in Social Sciences and Ethnic Studies.

CHIC 110B Intro to Chicana/o Studies

This course surveys Chicano Studies, focusing on historical and contemporary factors shaping Chicano society. It analyzes social, political, and economic influences on the Chicana/o community. Ideal for students interested in Chicana/o Studies, Social Studies, and Ethnic Studies.

CHIC 135 Chicana/o Literature

This course surveys Chicana/o literature from the 1800s to today, exploring genres and key contributors. It examines how literature reflects Chicana/o historical, socio-political, and cultural experiences, connecting to global movements. Ideal for Ethnic Studies and literature enthusiasts.

CHIC 141A U.S. History from a Chicano Perspective

This course surveys early American history from a Chicano perspective, focusing on the discovery period to Reconstruction and the Chicano contributions to U.S. political, social, economic, and cultural development. Ideal for history and ethnic studies.

CHIC 141B U.S. History from a Chicano Perspective

This course surveys American history from 1848 to the present, focusing on Chicano contributions, including slavery in former Mexican territories, Native American experiences, immigration, and California's constitutional development. Ideal for students interested in history, ethnic studies, or social issues.

Chicanx/Latinx Resources

CHIC 170 La Chicana

This course studies the Chicana in American society, focusing on feminist scholarship, cultural representations, border issues, resistance to patriarchy, and the search for power. Ideal for students interested in Chicana/o and Ethnic Studies.

CHIC 190 Chicano Images in Film

This course critically examines cinematic portrayals of Chicanos, from early stereotypical depictions to more complex, realistic portraits in recent films. It explores Hollywood features, documentaries, and “Chicano film.” Ideal for students interested in film and Ethnic Studies.

CHIC 210 Chicano Culture

This course studies Chicana/o culture in the U.S., focusing on historical and contemporary representations in music, dance, theater, literature, and film. Students apply Cultural Studies theories to analyze these cultural products. Ideal for students interested in Chicana/o culture and Ethnic Studies.

CHIC 230 Chicano Art

This course provides an overview of Chicano art from the 1960s to the early 21st century, emphasizing its historical,

social, and cultural context. Topics include paintings, murals, sculpture, and more. Ideal for students interested in Chicana/o Studies, Ethnic Studies, and art majors exploring contemporary movements.

CHIC 250 Intro - Chicana/o Dramatic Art

This course surveys Chicano and Latino theater, exploring its historical roots, techniques, styles, and literature. Students analyze its development within Chicana/o culture in the U.S. Southwest and Mexico. Ideal for Chicana/o Studies majors, and those interested in Dramatic Arts, Ethnic Studies, and literature.

Chicano Latina Graduation Celebration

In May, the college honors the academic achievements of our Chicano Latina graduates and is full of rich cultural heritage.

Hispanic Heritage Month

SDCC celebrates the period from September 15 to October 15 and recognizes the contributions of Hispanic and Latinx Americans to the group’s heritage and culture through various activities.



Noche de Familia

Noche de Familia is an evening event in September celebrating Chicanx and Latinx culture with dinner, music, entertainment, activities, and prizes. It fosters community through a vibrant celebration of heritage and unity.

Día de los Muertos

In October, SDCC’s Día de los Muertos event honors and remembers those who have passed, celebrating their lives with students and colleagues through meaningful traditions, community activities, and cultural remembrance.

Courses

Black Studies Department

The Black Studies Department offers an interdisciplinary exploration of the historical and contemporary experiences of people of African descent globally. Through collaboration with Chicano/Chicana Studies, English, and the local community, students develop skills to critically assess Black artistic expression, social issues like racism and class conflict, and social policies, while fostering active citizenship in the global community.

BLAS 100 Introduction to Black Studies

This course provides an overview of Black Studies, covering its origins, goals, and interdisciplinary approach to studying the

African experience in America and globally. Ideal for Black Studies, Ethnic Studies majors, and general learners.

BLAS 104 Black Psychology

This course introduces psychological concepts related to African American behaviors and perspectives, comparing Euro-American theories with Afri-centric approaches. Ideal for Black Studies majors and students interested in the ethnic studies aspects of psychology.

BLAS 116 Contemporary Social Problems from a Black Perspective

This course analyzes institutional racism and social change affecting African Americans, focusing on issues like the

prison industrial complex, gender, and healthcare. Ideal for Black Studies majors and those interested in Ethnic Studies, history, and current events.

BLAS 120 Black Music

This course explores African American musical forms in historical context, highlighting the African roots of various genres. Ideal for Black Studies and Ethnic Studies majors, and anyone interested in the history of African American music.

BLAS 130 The Black Family

This course examines the African American family, focusing on socio-cultural and psychological issues, including dating, marriage, divorce, gender roles, and community networks. Ideal for Black Studies and Ethnic Studies majors, and those interested in the Black family's historical and contemporary perspectives.

MLK Parade

In January, SDCC's students, faculty, classified professionals, and administrators create an award-winning float and participate in the MLK Parade, which celebrates the life and achievements of Martin Luther King Jr., an influential American civil rights leader.

Social Justice and Education Conference

The Social Justice and Education Conference highlights the vital role education plays in creating a just and equitable society. With over 500 participants, including faculty, classified professionals, administrators, and students, the event focuses on integrating social justice into education. Professor Paul Alexander emphasizes that education should foster civic engagement, not just produce workers, to build a meaningful and equitable community for all.

Rite of Passage Ceremony

In May, the San Diego Community College District's Black Graduates and Transfer Students Rite of Passage Ceremony is a districtwide celebration honoring academic excellence, determination, and the sacrifices that have led to the success of our students. The district's three colleges, City, Mesa and Miramar, rotate hosting this very cultural and spiritual event.



Black History Month

SDCC celebrates and honors Black History Month. There is a variety of events throughout the month to learn, honor, and celebrate the achievements of black men and women throughout history.

HUBU Annual Conference

In fall 2009, SDCC launched the Hermanos Unidos/Brothers United (HUBU) Conference to address the achievement gap among African American and Latino male students, focusing on informing, motivating, and preparing them for academic and personal success.



San Diego City College is proud to be a Black Serving Institution, where the success of Black students is a priority. With a significant Black student population, the college offers robust African American Studies programs, dedicated outreach to the Black community, and tailored student support services designed to improve retention and graduation rates.

Through these efforts, SDCC ensures that Black students have the resources, opportunities, and support needed to thrive academically, professionally, and personally while creating a vibrant, inclusive campus community.



Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Collective

SDCC is dedicated to empowering AAPI students through inclusive programs that foster academic and personal growth. A cornerstone of this effort, the Inclusive City Achievement Network (ICAN), offers specialized courses, the AAPI Alliance Club, and academic counseling tailored to the unique needs of AAPI students.

The Asian Pacific Islander Student Alliance (APSA), a student-led organization, builds community and champions social justice through cultural events and equity-focused initiatives. Programs like EOPS and Student Support Services provide crucial financial aid, tutoring, and advising. A \$2 million AANAPISI grant awarded in 2022 further enhances SDCC's support for AAPI and low-income students.

ARTF 125 Arts of the Asian Continent

This course surveys paintings, sculpture, architecture, and fine arts across Asia, highlighting the social, religious, and political influences on art from prehistoric to modern times. Ideal for art, history, and culture enthusiasts.

HIST 123 U.S. History with an Asian American Perspective

This course explores the global, national, and local forces shaping Asian Pacific Islander American lives from the 1850s to today, covering labor, migration, inclusion, racial politics, and California constitutionalism.

PHIL 106 Asian Philosophy

This course examines key issues in Asian philosophy, exploring the nature of the universe, human existence, and the qualities of a good life. Ideal for students interested in Pacific Rim or International Studies.

AAPI Heritage Month

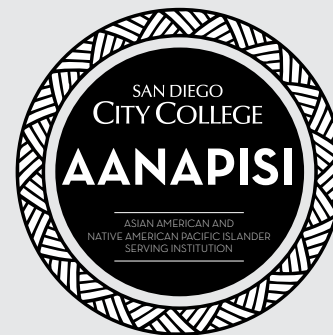
In May, AAPI Heritage Month celebrates the history, culture, and contributions of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, fostering diversity and inclusion.

Extended Opportunity Programs & Services (EOPS)

EOPS

EOPS offers enhanced support for eligible students, including priority enrollment, counseling, transfer assistance, and more. Designed for educationally disadvantaged students, EOPS provides resources like book awards, school supplies, and transit benefits to empower students from enrollment through transfer

Cooperative Agencies Resources for Education (CARE)

The CARE program supports single-parent students receiving CalWORKs cash aid. Designed to promote economic independence, CARE provides workshops, grants, transportation support, school supplies, meal cards, and networking opportunities. Eligible students are EOPS participants who are single head of household receiving CalWORKs (cash aid) for themselves and/or their child(ren).

NextUp

NextUP is a supplemental EOPS program designed to support current and former foster youth in reaching their educational and career goals. Providing “over and above” services, NextUP offers financial grants, priority registration, counseling, textbook support, and assistance with food, transportation, and technology.

Summer Readiness Program (SRP)

SRP is a 4-week program for first-time college students, featuring a Personal Growth class and social activities. SRP helps students transition smoothly to college by building community and boosting academic readiness.

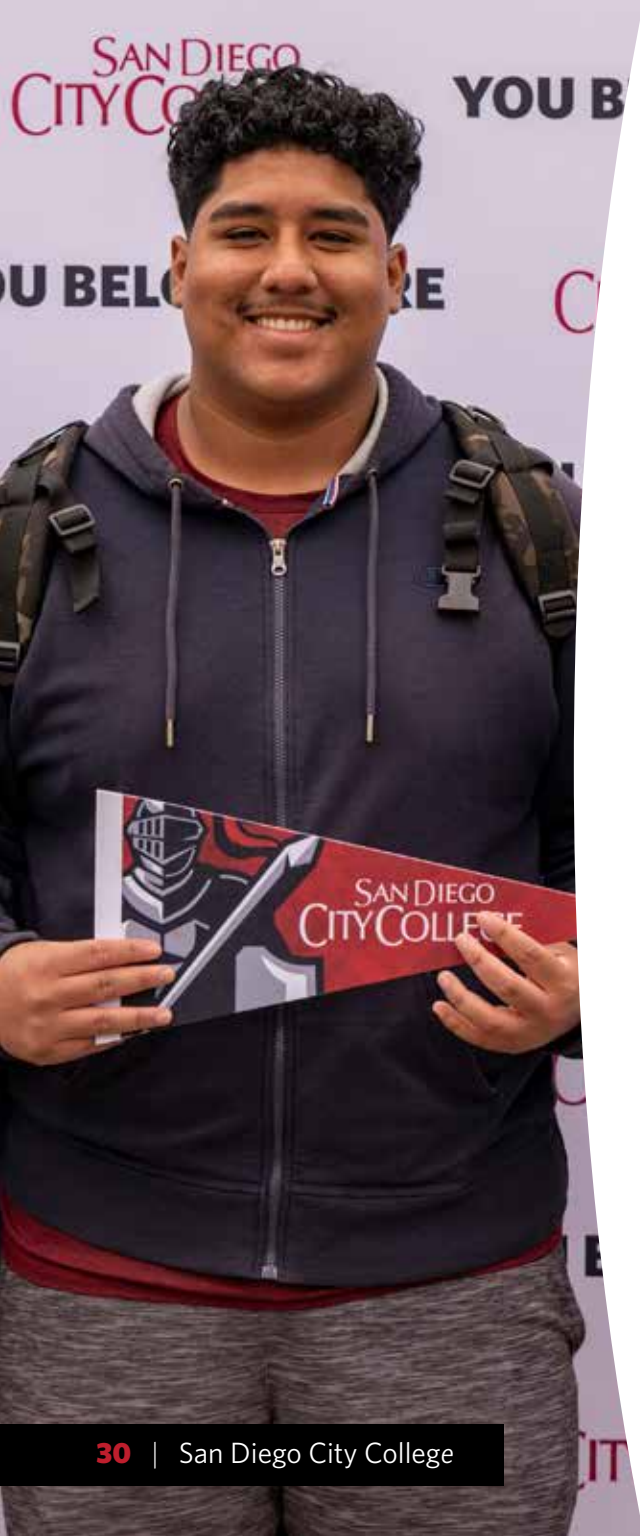

Their accomplishments continue to inspire current students, demonstrating that a strong educational foundation can open doors to a wide range of opportunities and help shape a successful future.



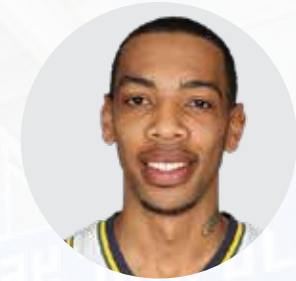
Katya Echazarreta
